Our History is Vanishing .. from the EH Gazette Sept. 1970

From Ruthie -I found this article in one of the Restoration for the Huguenot House binders, and it made me wonder how much has changed since. Where does East Hartford stand presently with protecting its history. (from article)

It starts out with **"There isn't a thing left in this town! All our historical buildings are vanishing!"** "...how many historical structures are left?" can you name more than one?"

"In 1968 the then 200-year-old house was donated to the historical society and moved to Martin Park as an effort to admire and respect our history. (*The Huguenot House is now well over 200 years Old.*) The East Hartford Historical Society has worked since then to raise funding for the move, restoration, and upkeep of the house interior. The town is responsible for the exterior upkeep, and yes being historical it is not a simple job."

Now in 2025 it is time once again to raise awareness and help procure funds to get the buildings at Martin Park repaired and protected!



Here is a July 1971 Letter – regarding donations to Huguenot House Fund Raiser request: I found it interesting as it mentions family connections. Many supporters of that time gave with earnest to save what appears now to be the oldest house still existent in East Hartford.

My sisters Charlotte M. Robertson who lives in South Glastonbury and Helen M. Catlett, who lives in The Highlands in East Hartford are very pleased with restoration of the Huguenot House.

Parents Charles & Lizzie Ranney Merriman were both born in East Hartford.
Mother went to school in the House and I think her teacher was a Miss Loomis.
Father at age 21 was Post Master in East Hartford and deeply involved in the community.
Perhaps the Wm Bemont who built the house might have been one of our ancestors as my grandfather was Joseph Merriman and he had three wives. Clara, Maud, and Gertrude Bemont
1 -& 2 were Beaumont sisters - 3 was a cousin of theirs also named Bemont.
It appears that different families chose to change the spelling to suit themselves.

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From a 1930's newspaper:

Thinking of getting an electric car---- In 1895 East Hartford had the only horse car remaining in operation in the area. In 1893 the trees along the center of Burnside Avenue were cut down to make way for trolley tracks. Horses proved impractical and electricity took over completely. By 1908 the total of 428 electric cars had passed through Church Corners daily.

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Here is a Winter puzzle for you... Just what does this 1720/1 receipt SAY? What exactly is William Pitkin Junior paying for?

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A bit from a <u>1940</u> Hartford Courant Magazine via a lengthy article titled "When the French Money Showered East Hartford"

"Today Silver Lane is a modern throughfare lined with middle class homes. Residents hear the drone of airplanes being tested in the nearby Pratt and Whitney plant. But the meadows where the troops camped are still there and, not much changed after all these years. (*compared to now*?) As mentioned above, the Pitkin house, where Rochambeau stayed, and the Forbes home, where the silver was stored before the payoff, are still standing. (*not there anymore*) Descendants of some of the families who lived there at the time of the French encampment still reside on the lane. Mrs. Fred Smith of 241 Silver Lance, formerly Miss Grace Roberts, is the great-great-granddaughter of George Roberts who helped quarter the French officers. Not long ago, Mrs. Smith acquired the old Pitkin property form her father, William Roberts, who lives on Main Street, just around the corner of the Lane. She has plans for restoring the place in keeping with it's romantic history. Mrs. Smith is also related to the Pitkin family who played host to Rochambeau." *There more of course also about the Warren House that once was the old Forbes House.*

"Mrs. Forbes daughter, Betty Forbes and Beverly Westbrook, whose mother was Ella Warren, unveiled the plaque in honor of the encampment in 1928. They were truly representative of the families who played host to the army from France. This plaque, set in a boulder surrounded by evergreen trees, stands just off the road in the grass, at the corner of Silver Lane and Lawrence Streets. "
