Summer like weather is finally upon us! As mentioned in the last newsletter, the **Historical Society is celebrating its 60th anniversary this year having been founded in 1964**.

We plan to have a get together between 5 & 7 PM this Summer in Martin Park. Because the park is much too crowded on weekends, having it on a weekday evening will allow us to reserve the pavilion area.

All members are welcome to attend. We will have a sheet cake, some pizza, liquid refreshments, and you can bring your own food. There will be a short newsletter coming out later in July that will announce the actual day, as we are trying to avoid school football practice.

The Makens Bemont or Huguenot House at East Hartford's Martin Park will officially open for the 2024 season on Connecticut Open House Day, Saturday, June 8th from 1 to 4PM.

I am desperately seeking members to volunteer that day and help welcome and assist visitors, making sure they sign the guest register and see the Burnham Blacksmith Shop and Goodwin School House.

On that day, the Selden Brewer House which is normally open on Saturdays, will also be open as usual for tours. Our regular Sunday afternoon openings from 1 to 4PM at Martin Park will be as follows:

July 7th, July 14th, July 21st, July 28th, August 4th, August 11th, August 18th and August 25th.

On <u>Sunday</u>, <u>June 2nd</u>. we will again participate in <u>Connecticut Trails Day</u>. For East Hartford History buffs, we'll be giving again the walk along the Connecticut River at Great River Park walking south across the Hockanum River pedestrian bridge, then walking a section of the East Coast Greenway.

The time will be 2 to 4PM. This weekend's weather forecast seems accommodating for an educational walk along two local rivers and kudos to the Conn. Forest & Park Association for having this statewide weekend event. Check out their website.

On <u>July 16th, 2024</u> at the Selden Brewer House, we will be participating in a "Sunset & Strings" event with the Town of East Hartford Park & Rec Department for everyone's enjoyment.

Below is some information that I've pulled from a recent donation of a wonderful family genealogy binder regarding the Kirbell Family. It was to be left with East Hartford Genealogy Club? the CT Society of Genealogy on Maple Street no longer takes the personally collections. So presently we have it at the Historical Society. It is a wonderful collection and the detail is wonderful. If you have an interest please give us a call.

This binder appears to be mostly from Kirbell family of the 1900's going back – Parmelee was major connection. Other names mentioned; Ely, Kennedy, Coton, Doddridge, Hills, Rierden, Bidwell, Forbes, Sumner, Boyce, Barlett, Cox, Campbell, gibbons, Ivers, Rowland, Seymour, and Whitehouse.

Ancestors mentioned:

John Pratt came to Hfd in 1632 ..

Some Gorgeous old photos of the 3 following:

Jane (Hills) Pratt wife of Adrial Ely Pratt (died 1895). she was born August 28, 1831 and died Dec. 9. 1881

<u>Mary Elizabeth Pratt Brewer</u> born July 1, 1851 died Nov. 8, 1933 – daughter of <u>Algernon and Delia Hills Pratt</u> She married Feb. 5, 1874 <u>Everett Ellsworth Brewer</u> who was born July 18, 1849 died Oct. 5, 1921 She was 1st cousin to Alice Maud Pratt Kirbell

There are old original (family copies) of deeds, wills, and other issues –

Parmelee – genealogy chart (sometimes used Palmerly) – goes back to 1635 when at age 20 he came to Guilford. also mentioned is Savage, Evarts and John Johnson.

Disassemble of timber Farm Barn that was at 25 Silver Lane –owned by Marion Kirbell and was relocated to 36 ferry Lane, in Simsbury to land owner Richard Davis. lots of photos of structure and house. (1990 – 91)

CT history online (2002) had J.F. Kirbell Harness Shop photo from 1908 - . photo was from CT His. Society

Charles L. Johnson - paperwork - an undertaker in 1900 - on the corner of Orchard and main St. EH.
